

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am so proud of us winning Tasmanian SLSC Club of the Year!!! We also won innovation Award of the Year

We have had a great year of consolidation. We are energised for a great new season too. This year I thought I would take a step back and write about how we are seen in the community. This is who we are, who we aim to be and what drives us as a club......

Kingston Beach Surf Life Saving Club (KBSLSC) not only provides a highly equitable and inclusive environment for its members, the club welcomes and collaboratively works with an array of community stakeholders to provide a welcoming and safe aquatic environment for all members of the community.

Although still a relatively young club in our own right, we are experiencing significant year on year growth with 407 members and a very healthy demographic diversity. We have solid numbers in patrol, emergency crew, youth, nippers and parent participation.

In KBSLSC we pride ourselves on providing opportunities for members to up skill and gain new awards and experiences that not only enhance personal growth but enable the club to provide the highest quality service to the community. To improve our members' skills and knowledge we run scenario-based training opportunities on a regular basis.

Some quick facts about our club:

- Membership of 407 members with sustainable demographic diversity
- Numerous and growing number of community collaborations
- The growth and consolidation of our Nippers program has been significant (183 members).
- Increased our carnival participation in all age groups at junior and senior carnivals including an exciting increase in our masters.
- 3 young people attended the Youth Pathways
 Cup and we had our first female masters
 competitor compete at the Aussies.
- Largest BM/SRC cohort in Tasmania this season.
 36 certifications granted.
- 6 strong patrol groups all with 10-15 members in each.

Kingston Beach SLSC aims to empower all members of the club to make a positive difference. This begins with our younger members who are encouraged and provided with mentorship, to hold important roles within the club which serves to create a strategically sustainable model. The club is very proud of our young leaders who are continually developing and enhancing their skills across all areas of our club.

Three success stories of supporting our youth in leadership roles:

- Our current club secretary is 24. Our prior club secretary started the role at the age of 18. At the age of 25 she continues in the busy communications role.
- Our general club committee has two members under the age of 24 and four of our ten members are under 28.
- Our senior coach is 28 providing great mentorship for our young athletes.
- Our club now has a designated Youth
 Committee with active roles and initiatives
 under their watch and a voice to the general
 committee.



These are the highlights that we have achieved in the last 12 months:

- Kingston Beach SLSC is committed to a way of working that embraces a culture of continuous improvement.
- The constant rejig of the nipper's structure and particularly closing books to ensure quality experiences and sustainable operation. On the beach in the 22/23 season, we have had: 183 junior and youth, 12-15 water safety, 14 age managers, and numerous engaged parents.
- Consolidation of member numbers and systems for ease and sustainability. We are constantly evolving our approach in response to the growing numbers and the commitment to maximising the member experience to capture their individual motivation and satisfaction drivers.
- Number and diversity of people gaining qualifications including IRB and Sandra's silver medallion
- Achieved increased impact in 'Discoverable
 Defibs': a community responder program'
 with new Blackmans Bay defib in
 collaboration with Blackmans Bay
 Association. And won innovation of the year
 recently for this initiative.
- Expanded our 'Step up program: Encouraging Youth Leadership'. We have pathways to 'step up' for our young people such as ocean swim water safety coordination, age managers and coaches, MCing awards night, youth committee participation, commercial water safety coordinator, community collaboration design and implementation, youth led fundraising initiatives.

We financially assist our members to upgrade their training qualifications each year to enable them to train/assess our patrolling members and we aim to help provide pathways to many professional development opportunities to other members, including:

- Sending our young secretary to the National Leadership Conference in Sydney
- Subsidising all core award fees for our members
- Sending our committee members and office bearers to all SLST sanctioned lifesaving conferences and workshops
- Having extensive representation on SLST committees and working groups.

KBSLSC has a strong commitment to community engagement, initiatives and collaborations including:

- Hosting two ocean swim races each year as part of the Tasmanian Ocean Swim Series (Raine & Horne Kingsborough Rentals Swim and 'Kings Quarters Beach2Beach' swim).
- Co-ordinating and evolving the inclusive and educational Starfish nippers' program to children with disabilities.
- Supporting the local 'Beach2Bush' educational school program in our local area.
- Landcare collaboration and as Derwent Estuary environmental ambassadors.
- Providing water safety services to local schools, sporting groups and community events.

FINANCE

The financial statements as presented to the auditor in the closing of this report.

Summary of income and expenditure for the past year is as follows:

Income for the club is \$117 628
Expenditure for the club is \$99 387
Surplus for the year is \$18 241

This year has been a steady year for the club financially.

We have instigated a new system for our petrol fuel requirements for IRB and related vehicles. There will be a system in place to make sure that this is both easy on patrolling members to undertake but rigorous in terms of financial accountability.

The second area we have focussed on is the club credit cards. With club growth and breadth, we needed to support member in dynamic leadership role and responsibilities to have a method of payment that was not onerous. This new system covers off on the needs for accountability and reporting balanced with ease and convenience.

Moving forward in line with the club's continuous improvement model, priorities are to look at strong financial sustainability in all areas of the club. This includes both direct ways financially but also in terms of our people resources being well supported. Long term club health needs this balance.

LIFESAVING

What a busy and exciting season we've just had!

This season saw us put through our highest number of new Bronze and SRC members, with 36 people gaining their award. This is a fantastic effort from individuals in dedicating their time to achieving a new award, but also highlights the time and devotion put in by our trainers and assessors. We were so pleased to have experienced patrolling members offer to help at training sessions this season and with those numbers completing their award, it certainly alleviated some pressure from our regular trainers. A big thanks as always must go to Bridget for her tireless organization of our club training for the season. It is not an easy task to organize a schedule, paperwork, communication etc but Bridget always seems to make it all happen seamlessly.

Other awards our members gained this season were the new Silver Medallion Patrol Captain's award, First aid and Advanced Resuscitation awards. 2 of our club members were also facilitators of the new patrol captain award and travelled the state delivering this to other clubs. Congratulations to our members who recently gained their trainer award. This will certainly enable us to continue to provide excellent training across all awards.

An exciting part of this season was working in collaboration with the newly formed Raspin's Beach Surf Club to assist them with lifesaving and education. It's great to be able to share our training with our friends at Raspins!

Overall Kingston Beach Surf Club recorded more that 2600 patrol hours across all 7 patrol groups, and we know from experience that this number is actually quite a bit more. The importance of our service is well recognized when, in just the time we patrolled, we recorded close to 21 000 beach goers! Not only does our patrol provide a safe environment for our community to enjoy the beautiful waters of Kingston, Blackmans Bay and the surrounding water, we also provide first aid and education to the public. This season we had 28 recorded first aid incidents and over 160 preventative actions documented. Our club participated in the Rainbow Beaches patrol this season, appreciating the great diversity and inclusion surf lifesaving offers. We also participated in the female appreciation patrol across the state, celebrating the role women have played in surf lifesaving.

The foundation of all surf clubs is lifesaving. The dedication of our patrolling members allow the club to fulfill our lifesaving agreement and provide the community with a safe place to swim. Without our dedicated volunteer lifesavers, our club would not be able to hold nippers or compete at surf sports, so a massive thank you to all our patrolling members who have donated their time over the busy season. Special mention must go to Makayla who volunteered a massive 125 hours, Will who contributed 98 hours and Kat 89 hours. Also to Liv, Tilly, Mia, Inara and Janelle who all achieved over 50 hours. Thanks everyone!

We must also thank our Patrol Captains who take on the extra responsibility of leading and organizing their patrol team. They also ensure the patrol has the correct awards covered to fulfill our lifesaving agreement (which can at times be tricky) and general ensure the hot chips arrive just in time to ward off the cold afternoon wind. Thank you for all you do.

LIFESAVING

Our Emergency Response Team are available not just during the patrol season, but all year round to respond to aquatic incidents via deployment from TasPolice (through SLST). We also have several members of our club in the flood and swift water response team, and also the drone team. Our ERT have already performed several callouts this year and have been congratulated on our speedy response time. Thanks to all those members who make themselves available throughout the year.

To ensure we are able to continue all these services, it is vital that we have our equipment rescue ready and fully operational. A big thanks to Jake Wickert for his continued work in maintaining our IRBs, motors and CanAm this season.

To all our valuable and dedicated lifesavers, we would like to thank you and you families for all you give to our club to allow us to provide a safe aquatic environment for our community to enjoy.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES

Season 2022-23 was another massive season for our Juniors. We broke records again with memberships, having 165 children from age 5-14 engage in our Nippers program. We were forced once again to cap numbers in certain age groups to ensure we continued to provide a quality program with the limited resources available. It is fantastic that so many members of our community want to be part of our club and see the value in providing their children with the skills and experiences to be safe in and around the water.

We found that this season, parents were more engaged and willing to get involved, with more parents obtaining their Surf Rescue Certificates and Bronze Medallions to be able to assist with our water safety requirements, and even a few trying their hand in master's competitions.

Our 2022-23 season was once again condensed and interrupted due to scheduling of state and national events, however we were still able to

provide 12 Sunday sessions throughout the

season, the addition of a fun Friday session to

celebrate before the Christmas break, and many

We continued with our additional surf sports training and had the opportunity to join members from Clifton Beach, Carlton Park and Raspins Beach with a Friday night board session hosted by Clifton Beach SLSC. We are building fantastic relationships with our fellow southern clubs and are working together to provide opportunities for all our young members. This is something we are looking to continue and build on in seasons

to come.

We had many more Nippers come along to statewide carnivals, with a massive 50 participants come along to the Clifton Beach carnival in February and 39 attend the State Championships in Penguin. We had some amazing results with our team taking home 20 individual medals, 17 team event medals and our team taking gold in the coveted All Age Relay, with the club finishing 6th overall in the championship points score.



In June, the club initiated a survey of our junior cohort and their families to get feedback on how they feel about the program we offer and what improvements we can make. We had a great response to the survey and received some valuable information which will help shape our program moving forward. The resounding message we received however is that on the whole, members are happy with what we offer, they see the value in providing their children with quality surf education and how to be safe in and around the water, feel welcomed, valued and love being part of our big surf family. We are now working on what actions we will take from the survey results and put them into play throughout the season.

We're excited for the season to come, especially hosting a junior carnival on our home beach, the first in 9 years, and can't wait to showcase our little piece of paradise to the rest of the state. We will also be welcoming some new equipment with 8 nipper boards and 3 foamies heading our way thanks to the State Government's Sport and Active Recreation Equipment Grant we were successful in receiving. The future is bright for our Kingston Beach Nippers and we continue to be proud of what we can offer the young people of our community.

MEMBERSHIP

The 2022/23 has been a busy year for the memberships. The demand for our nippers program has lead to a to lot of thought being put into can we manage the demand for increased interest and if not, what can we put into place to best manage numbers, prioritise our current members and have a fair process for new members. This led to creating a waiting list for new members and an intense night with Bridget and Janelle in working who we could accept. This also meant that once memberships were approved, there were a lot to process in a short space of time. It did avoid a potential website crash given the amount of people who may have been applying if we set an opening time for registration given the level of demand! We continue to encourage parents and active members to gain appropriate qualifications or take on a role in our nippers program so we can meet demand in the future.

All memberships were done on line this season and the majority of members were able to process their own memberships without needing any assistance. There were a few systems issues and difficulties with family groups that were generally sorted out quite easily.

We had 408 members in the 2022/23 season, which is similar to the 404 amount we had in the previous season. Given many age groups in the nippers program are at capacity, it is likely that junior membership numbers will stay around this figure. All age groups from seahorses to under 11 have at least 20 nippers enrolled.

We had 183 junior members, 82 active members and 142 other members, with the majority of other members being nipper parents. We had a drop of 6 in active members from the 2021/22 season to the 2022/23 season but an increase of 12 in our other members. We also have a 70 year age span between our youngest and oldest member, with the youngest being 6 and oldest 76.

SURF SPORTS

Another epic season for Kingston Beach Surf Sports – our senior membership grew with a significant group of incoming U14s joining our training and competition group, along with some new faces. To support our squad's growth, we established the inaugural Senior Activities Committee, comprised of myself, Michelle, Sandra, Olivia Cripps, and Olivia Smith.

This committee convened monthly to discuss all aspects of training, development,

equipment, and fundraising.

In the realm of training, Adam, Stuart, Olivia, and Sandra assumed regular coaching positions, leading additional training sessions for our athletes. At the beginning of the season, Sandra, Olivia, and I completed our development coaching accreditation, which involved an online theory component and practical training at the pre-season development squad camp at Lake Barrington. In the upcoming season, we aspire to sponsor more aspiring coaches to progress and attain coaching accreditations.

We celebrated fantastic achievements early in the season, with three Kingston Beach competitors – U14s Will and Ewan, and U17 Tempest – earning spots in the Tasmanian state squad. For the first time in many years, Tasmania was represented at the Interstate Championships and Youth Pathways Cup. We are immensely proud of how Will, Ewan, and Tempest represented both the state and KBSLSC, serving as excellent role models for our emerging junior members.

A need for expansion of our fleet was underscored during the 2021/22 State Titles when we found ourselves with a team in every double ski category but only one double ski. The proceeds from the annual quiz night were directed towards a new double ski, successfully raising \$4000 for this purpose. Unfortunately, due to constraints related to raw materials and high demand, we did not receive the double ski in time for the 2022/23 State Titles.

Nevertheless, it is poised for use in the upcoming season. Additionally, we were fortunate to augment our craft fleet with two more club mals and four ski paddles, thanks to a remarkably generous donation.

The pinnacle of the season was the Open State Championships, held at Carlton Park Surf Club, with 20 competitors representing Kingston across four age groups. Noteworthy individual results included Will's gold medal victory in the U17 male beach sprint and Ewan's second-place finish in the U15 male surf race (despite being in the U14 age category). Equally impressive were our team events, where our sheer numbers and inclusive spirit often led us to outperform stronger clubs. Accumulating a total of 144 championship points over the weekend, we secured an overall 4th place in the state.
